Regional. Four regional PHARMINE/PHAR-QA offices will act as regional management boards and will deal with the various regions of Europe

c. Northern: directed by P6d. Eastern: directed P7e. Western: directed P4f. Southern: directed by P3

During the first year, regional directors will recruit a network of associated partners, stakeholders and consultants. This will constitute the first full European network of correspondents in QA in PET. Associated HEIs will be recruited from 27-2 (Cyprus and Luxembourg do not have pharmacy HEIs) EU member states plus other European countries in the EHEA. Initial recruitment will be amongst members of the EAFP and / or the PHARMINE network. The PHARMINE database has full contact details for just under 200 European HEIs. This will be the basis of the PHAR-QA network. Other partners will come in by snowballing *i.e.* recruitment on recommendation of existing network member. Further recruitment will use the membership databanks of PGEU, EIPG, EHEA and EPSA.

Subsequently in the second and third years the network will

- Provide general advice and guidance as to the situation in their HEI and/or country. It is to be noted
  that all those involved in the project have extensive experience of and contacts with national
  governments and have or are involved in healthcare policy. They also have the same experience of
  national and international industry.
- Reply to the modified Delphi/TUNING questionnaires on questions such as:
  - What local, national, European and / or international systems of QA exist and are used in their HEI and / or country?
  - o What is their opinion on such systems and their use?
  - o What suggestions would they have on how to modify the system?
  - What do they think of the PHAR-QA system to be developed by the PHAR-QA project?
- Organize an evaluation of the PHAR-OA system

No budget is allocated in this bid for the work of the network associated partners; attempts will be made to find some form of remuneration for their efforts.

Budgets for staff costs for P1 and P2 are larger than those for other partners. This is explained by the importance of the role of, and work to be done by P1 (administrator) and P2 (executive director).
